BRITAIN IN BLOOM SUCCESS



Connaught Gardens

In August in 90 minutes judging took place in the bid for the Britain in Bloom title. The criteria on which the town is judged is diverse. Marks are awarded in five sections covering floral displays, permanent landscaping, ecological considerations, local environmental quality and public awareness. Parks and gardens, public buildings, roadside planting, business premises, residential gardens and special features are looked at in the floral display category.

In addition to seeing public gardens at the height of Summer, the judges ask for photographs to prove that they have form and colour in spring and autumn.

Allotments are included under residential gardens and here judges look for evidence of rotational cropping and the use of composting. They dock marks if it appears weed killer has been used excessively in controlling road verges.

Blackmore Gardens provided some special features, with the perennial peacock strutting in a different corner and tortoises adding extra interest.

Britain in Bloom is now keen to see evidence of sustainable development in floral efforts, with particular attention paid to

reducing use of energy and raw materials and limiting waste and pollution. Protection of animals and their habitats is also given prominence.

Judges look out for facilities to enable collection of recyclable materials and how businesses, charities and individuals assist collections and community composting. Factors affecting marks for local environment quality are litter, graffiti, dog fouling, vandalism, flyposting, weedy streets and pavements and the condition of street furniture.

Public awareness of Britain in Bloom efforts also gains marks and judges look for evidence that the local committee has made positive arrangements to publicise its campaign and carry out fundraising for projects. All this contributes at the same time to making Sidmouth the gloriously colourful and well kept place that you all enjoy.

Well done Sidmouth for winning the small town category in the Nationals. There is a lot more to it than meets the eye.

The town council has again backed revised plans but English Heritage has repeated its objections.

The next action will see the matter being referred to the Secretary of State for the Environment.

SIDMOUTH GATEWAY TO WORLD HERITAGE SITE

News in December should reveal if approval has been given in the bid to secure World Heritage Site status for East Devon and Dorsets coastline. Earlier in the year Dr Dingwall, a New Zealander from the International Union for the conservation of Nature appointed by UNESCO flew in a helicopter from the cricket field taking him from Exmouth to Lulworth Cove to report on the bid. Sidmouth, Beer, Seaton, Axmouth and Lyme Regis and the famous fossil filled cliffs at Charmouth were examined. I was lucky enough to attend a seminar explaining the importance of the area and the excitement and enthusiasm the professionals had was electric. Dr Dingwall explained that it was being promoted by the UK Government and local authorities "as the best representative" of the Mesozoic era - 190 million years ago - and was the most accessible and best protected area. The coast contains a complete record through almost 200 million years of earth history during the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous periods of geological time. However you don't have to be a geologist to appreciate this world class coastline.
