GOLDEN JUBILEE EDITION

We were honoured to be invited to be the venue for the launch of The Royal Golden Jubilee edition of the Sidmouth Guide. Officially launched by Joy Seward, president of Sidmouth & District Hotels & Caterers Association, with 50 golden balloons outside the Royal Glen. The first of the 30,000 guides off the printing press was sent to the Queen in a gold envelope along with a letter from the town clerk. It was handed over by Councillor Mr Hughes Chairman of Sidmouth Town Council's tourism and publicity

committee to John Dunster, postman for the council, who said it would be franked with a Sidmouth stamp before being sent registered post to Buckingham Palace. The 2002 edition has been dedicated to the Queen with a double-page feature on the royals and their contacts with Sidmouth. The guide has a special leather-feel cover and contains some stunning photographs of the town and its attractions. FROM THE 2002 TOWN GUIDE

A Town with a Royal history

The band played and the bells rang out in December 1819 when the Duke and Duchess of Kent, with the infant Princess Victoria, arrived at Woolbrook Cottage, now the Royal Glen Hotel. Their stay, however, was tragically short, for the Duke died on January 23rd from complications after a heavy cold. His coffin lay in state here for several days and was seen by some 3000 people. But the funeral was delayed because of the death, six days later of his father, King George III. Not until February 7th did the cortege leave Sidmouth through streets lined by silent crowds. In 1856 Edward, Prince of Wales, stayed at the Royal York Hotel, visiting Woolbrook Cottage to see where his grandfather died and where his mother slept as a baby.

Fortunately, not all Sidmouth's royal connections are tinged with such sadness. A favourite Royal visitor was the Duke of Connaught, Queen Victoria's third son. He first came in 1931 and in 1934 gave his name to Connaught Gardens so admired today by visitors from all over the world. In 1986 the present Duchess of Kent visited Sidmouth for the Salcombe Hill Landscape Appeal. In February 1999 Princess Anne carried out the official opening of the modernisation of Sidmouth Victoria Hospital.



THE DEVORAN 'THE PINK HOTEL'



MEMORABLE STAY

Launched this year was the film *Iris* based on books by John Bayley, husband of author Iris Murdoch. In a book that has Iris's Alzheimer's Disease as a prevalent theme, it is ironic that some of the details got confused. Do you recognise any of the following:- *"I would drive them for a brief holiday to Sidmouth, staying at a little hotel in a sort of crevasse that ran down to the promenade and the sea. The hotel was an old one and claimed some connection with the Duke of Wellington, which seemed unlikely. But the bar was stocked with an excellent Australian red wine called Long Tom, or maybe something else, of which we always drank a bottle at supper, and sometimes two."* Father, Orson Crane remembers the visits. In the Charles room there is a portrait of the Duke of Wellington, but the more likely ducal connection that Iris's husband was intending to refer to is that with the Duke of Kent... And the wine, Long Tom? is of course Long Flat Red still on the wine list and very popular.
